

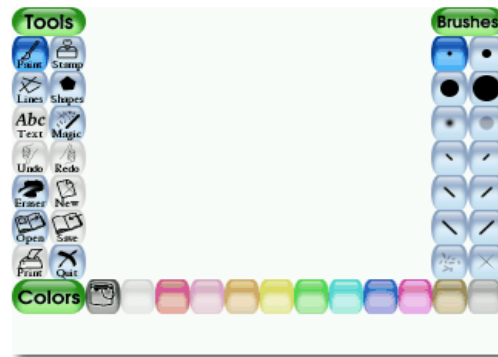
# Tux Paint Tutorial

## Step 3: Coloring Book Page Option

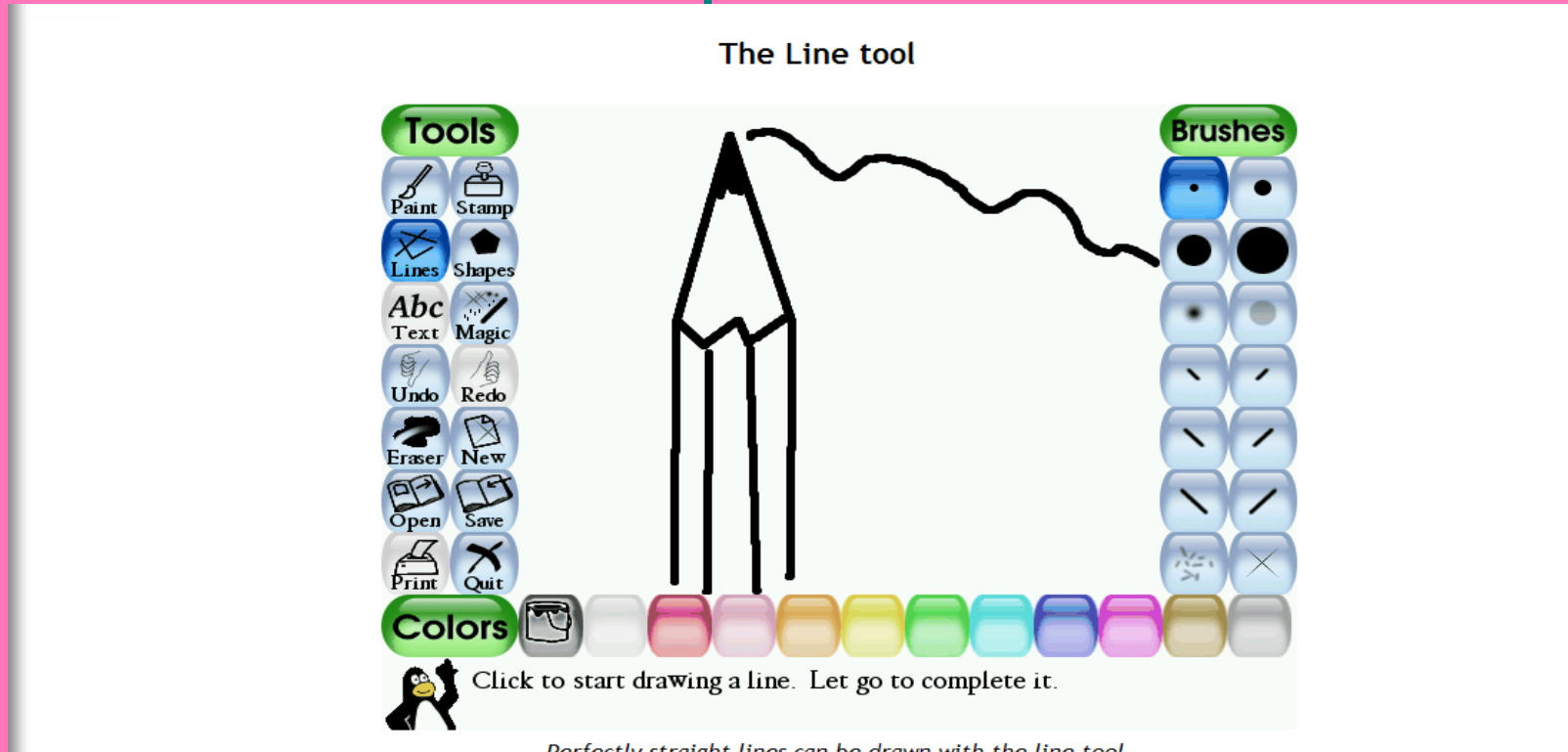

The program allows people to color the various pictures by clicking on the colors listed at the bottom. The various tools along the side allow people to format the picture. The magic portion allows for more formatting options.

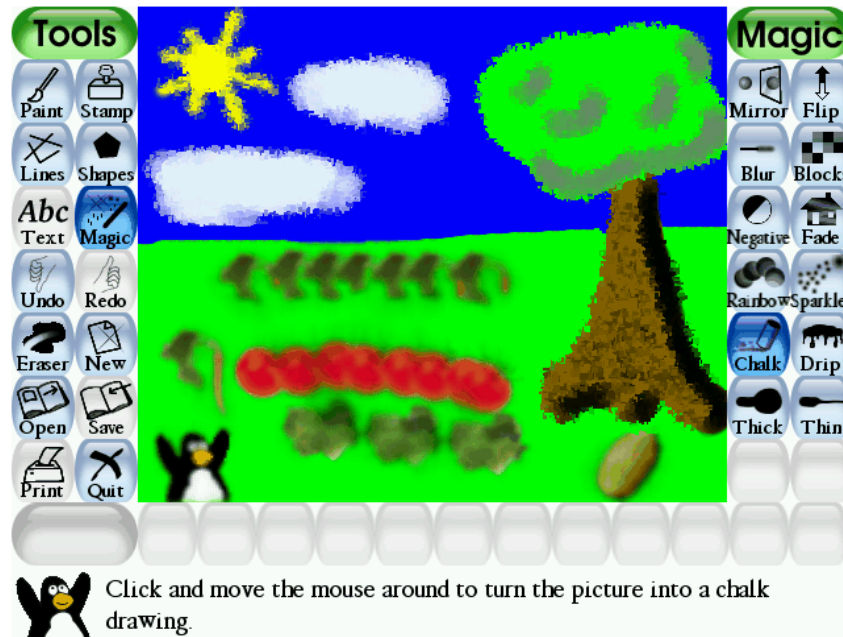
## Step 4: Tools



When a person clicks on a various tool different options come up. This is an example of a line tool. You click with the mouse to start drawing a line and let go to stop drawing.

## Step 5: Magic Tools

The chalk and blur magic tools

This is an example of a picture with the use of a magic tool. The person clicked on the chalk tool to cause the picture to appear like it was done with chalk. There are various other options to choose from that are listed on the side.

## Step 6: Saving a Picture



When you want to save a picture a screen will come up that asks if you want to save this file. After, simply click on the option you want.
